**TOPS Competition bridging the gap between law enforcement and citizens -
Minister Cuthbert-Flynn**

“Awardees, you are, in fact, more than police officers, you are catalysts for hope and agents of transformation,” declares Minister of State in the Ministry of National Security and Peace, the Hon. Juliet Cuthbert-Flynn.

The State Minister made the remark on Thursday (October 18) while delivering greetings at the Transforming Our Police Service (TOPS) Awards Ceremony for Area 5, held at the National Police College of Jamaica in Twickenham Park, Spanish Town, St. Catherine.

Minister Cuthbert-Flynn pointed out that the awards ceremony is a powerful symbol of commitment that bridges the gap between law enforcement and citizenry.

She further added, **“It also honours the dedication and resilience of our officers, whose efforts continue to strengthen the fabric of public safety in Jamaica now more than ever.”**

The TOPS Competition, organised by the Police Civilian Oversight Authority (PCOA), is a strategic tool that was launched in 2019, to deepen the alignment of the policies of the Jamaica Constabulary Force (JCF) while uplifting the morale of police officers.

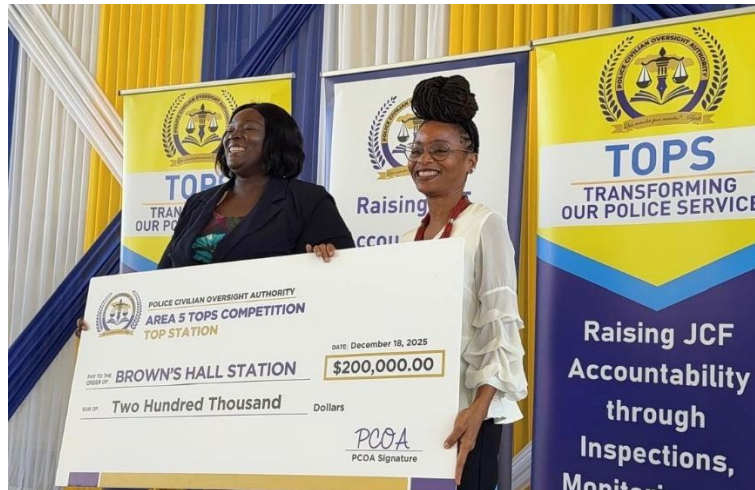
